# Forthcoming RBS Courses

RARE BOOK SCHOOL is an independent, non-profit and tax-exempt institute supporting the study of the history of books and printing and related subjects. Founded in 1983, it moved to its present home at the University of Virginia in 1992.

Each year, Rare Book School (RBS) offers about 30 five-day noncredit courses for adults on topics concerning book history, old and rare books, manuscripts, and special collections. Courses are almost always limited to 12 or fewer students, who make a full-time commitment to any course they attend, from 8:30 am to 5 pm, Monday through Friday.

In the Baltimore sessions and the March session in Charlottes-ville, reasonably priced accommodations are readily available in near-by hotels. In the June and July Charlottesville sessions, air-conditioned dormitory housing is also available. Students attending Charlottesville courses are encouraged to take advantage of RBS's relatively inexpensive housing to arrive a few days before their course, or stay a few days later, in order to give themselves (and their families) a better chance to explore central Virginia, which includes many sites of historic, educational, and scenic interest as well as various vacation attractions.

The educational and professional prerequisites for RBS courses vary. Some are broadly directed toward antiquarian booksellers, book collectors, bookbinders, conservators, teachers, and professional and avocational students of the history of books and printing. Other courses are primarily intended for particular constituencies (for example, professional rare book catalogers, or private collectors) within these broad areas.

Many RBS courses are offered annually; others are offered every two or three years. A subject-order list of courses, along with the dates when they are most likely next to be offered, may be found on the inside opening of this flyer; a chronological schedule of courses is provided on the back page.
