In 2008, RBS offers about 30 five-day non-credit courses in January and in June through November, held at the University of Virginia in Charlottesville (June through August), at the Grolier Club in New York City (January), at the Walters Art Museum and Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore (November), at the Morgan Library & Museum in New York City (October), and at the Freer/Sackler Galleries of the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, DC (October).

RARE BOOK SCHOOL is an independent, nonprofit and tax-exempt institute supporting the study of the history of books and printing and related subjects. Founded in 1983, it moved to its present home at UVa in 1992.

Each year, Rare Book School (RBS) offers about 30 five-day non-credit courses for adults on topics concerning book history, old and rare books, manuscripts, and special collections. Courses are almost always limited to 12 or fewer students, who make a full-time commitment to any course they attend, from 8:30 am to 5 pm, Monday through Friday.

In the Charlottesville and Baltimore sessions, reasonably priced accommodations are readily available in nearby hotels. In the June, July, and August Charlottesville sessions, airconditioned dormitory housing is also available. Students attending Charlottesville courses are encouraged to take advantage of RBS's relatively inexpensive housing and arrive a few days before their course or stay a few days later, in order to give themselves (and their families) a better chance to explore central Virginia, which includes many sites of historic and scenic interest as well as various vacation attractions.

The educational and professional prerequisites for RBS courses vary. Some are broadly directed toward antiquarian booksellers, book collectors, bookbinders, conservators, curators, rare book librarians, teachers, and professional and avocational students of the history of books and printing. Other courses are primarily intended for particular constituencies (for example, professional rare book catalogers, or private collectors) within these broad areas.

Many RBS courses are offered annually; others are offered every two or three years. A subject-order list of courses, along with the dates when they will next be offered, is set forth below; a chronological schedule of forthcoming courses is provided on the back panel.

RBS 2008 tuition is \$895 per course. Courses are held at UVa in Charlottesville except where otherwise noted below (CALRBS refers to courses offered by California RBS; for details, see www.calrbs.org). Dates below without years refer to courses being offered in 2008.

RBS has substantial scholarship funds available for courses offered in 2009; see the RBS website for details. (The deadline for 2009 scholarship applications is 1 September 2008).
