The RBS Week

All RBS students are expected to be in attendance on time for all of the regularly scheduled classes, labs, and field trips of the courses that they are attending. This is to ensure the quality and community of RBS as a school, and we insist that participants attend all sessions of all courses, unless under the most extraordinary of circumstances. Practically speaking, this involves a full-time commitment of 9–5, Mon–Thur, and 9–4 on Friday. Please make your travel plans accordingly!

MONDAY, 8:30 am Student Registration

Freer Gallery of Art and Arthur M. Sackler Gallery Library Registration, including the distribution of *RBS Student's Vade Mecum* and namebadges, will take place just before 9 am on Monday morning in the seminar room of the Sackler Gallery.

Note: Please meet us in front of the Ripley Center next to the Freer Gallery on Jefferson Drive SW indicated by the vertical arrow on the map on page 12, no later than 8:30 am so that the class can move as a group through building security. Latecomers cannot go through the building without an escort, so it is important to arrive promptly and move a as a group through security each day.

Before You Arrive

Reading Lists


Students should come to class prepared. Students who have trouble locating required readings might obtain them through a variety of sources, including Interlibrary Loan (ILL), used and antiquarian booksellers, through the Antiquarian Booksellers Association of America (ABAA) at www.abaa.org, or via online books services like www.bookfinder.com and www.vialibri.net.

Logistics

When thinking about and working on your transportation arrangements, please remember that staying over Friday night after your last day of class is an excellent idea, if you can possibly swing it. Washington, DC early-evening ground and air travel on Fridays is seldom much fun. First-timers at RBS are often surprised at the intensity of the experience. Get some sleep before you come, if you can.

Freer Gallery of Art and Arthur M. Sackler Gallery Library, Smithsonian Institution Libraries

The Freer Gallery of Art and Arthur M. Sackler Gallery Library, Smithsonian Institution Libraries is located at 1050 Independence Avenue SW and at Jefferson Drive SW and 12th Street on the National Mall, next door to the Smithsonian's Castle and across the street from the U.S. Department of Energy and the northern end of L'Enfant Promenade. There are two entrances to the combined museums, the Sackler entrance on Independence Avenue and the Freer entrance on Jefferson Drive.



Transportation to Washington, DC

Washington is well-served by Reagan National (DCA) and Dulles (IAD) airports. Reagan National is on the Yellow and Blue lines of the Washington subway system (the Metro). Washington Flyer coach service (www.washfly.com) connects Dulles with the West Falls Church Metro Station; purchase tickets—\$10 one way; \$18 round trip—inside the vestibule of Door 4 on the Dulles Arrivals/Baggage Claim level (for further information, phone 1-888-WASH-FLY). Both airports are serviced by SuperShuttle (1-800-258-3826); a one-way fair is \$12 from DCA and \$29 from IAD.

Amtrak uses the centrally located Union Station (north of the U.S. Capitol, a mile and a half northeast of the Freer/Sackler Galleries).

Parking

On the street, metered and other parking in the general neighborhood of the Freer/Sackler is restricted to two hours or less, and is thus of no use to RBS course participants.

The Smithsonian does not provide parking. All-day public parking in the Smithsonian/Mall neighborhood is hard to find and prohibitively expensive. If you are driving to Washington, be sure to book a room in a hotel that provides parking at a price you are willing to pay; hotel parking can be very expensive in D.C. If you will need hotel accommodation, your best bet may be to go onto one of the many websites specializing in competitively priced travel arrangements, and see what you can turn up.

There are several hotels within walking distance of the Freer/Sackler. They include:

Harrington Hotel. 436 11th Street NW, at E Street (800-424-8532 or 202-628-8140; www.hotel-harrington.com). The best bet for a moderately priced hotel; prices range from \$125 to \$169/night. Nearest Metro stop: Metro Center (12th St and F St NW). Harrington Hotel parking is available at PMI Garage, 1325 G Street, a short walk from the hotel for \$15/day.

Capitol Hill Suites. 200 C Street SE (800-424-9165 or 202-543-6000; www.capitolhillsuites.com). The only hotel actually on Capitol Hill; about \$1800 for the week with breakfast included.

JW Marriott Hotel. 1331 Pennsylvania Avenue (202-393-2000; www.marriott.com); about \$460/night during the week and \$320/ night for the weekend.

Willard Intercontinental. 1401 Pennsylvania Avenue NW (202-628-9100; www.washington.intercontinental.com); about \$479/ night for the week and \$319/night for the weekend. Another option is the "Park & Park" for \$529/night during the week and \$369/ night for the weekend; this includes valet parking and breakfast for two every day.

If you can't find anything suitable in the general vicinity of the Mall, bear in mind that the Freer/Sackler is directly across the street from the Smithsonian stop on the Metro's Orange and Blue lines at 1200 Independence Avenue. Advance Advices

Here follows general advice and comfort about Rare Book School courses at the Freer Gallery of Art and Arthur M. Sackler Gallery Library in Washington, DC

Incoming Phone Messages and Mail

Non-urgent phone messages may be left with the main RBS office (434-924-8851) for relaying to the Freer/Sackler. Urgent messages may be left directly at the Freer/Sackler Library (202-633-0477); tell the person who answers the phone that you need to leave a message for a participant in the RBS Japanese book illustration course currently being held in the Library's seminar room.

Email and the Internet

Bringing laptops to class is discouraged. Please check with your individual hotel about access to the Internet in your room. The Freer/Sackler Galleries do not offer free public Wi-Fi; the nearest location that offers free public Wi-Fi is the Smithsonian Castle Café.

Guests

You are welcome to invite guests to attend the Friday afternoon reception.

Privacy

RBS publishes a list of its participating students in the *RBS Student's Vade Mecum*. If you do not want your address information to appear in the *Vade Mecum*, please contact RBS's Program Director, Amanda Nelsen, a week in advance of the course.

Security

For reasons of security, you may be asked to provide a photo ID while you are in the Freer/Sackler building. Please bring a photo ID with you at all times during the course.

What to Bring

At RBS, dress is business casual for all events. Fall weather in Washington, D.C. can be chilly; plan to bring reasonably warm attire, especially if you will have a significant outdoor commute to class from your hotel. Bring a sweater as the classroom is on the cold side. It is a good idea to check a long-range forecast before you leave for Washington; go to www.weather.com and type "20590" into the box in the top-left corner of your screen.

RBS participants are encouraged to come to class prepared, and they are required to be on time. Bring a watch. If you wish to take notes, plan accordingly. In the classroom only pencils are allowed (no mechanical pencils please). Pencils, paper, and other supplies are available nearby. While RBS faculty may occasionally assign homework, it is unnecessary to bring a computer. Before leaving home, check both your course homepage and reading lists for specific instructions on what to bring. It is not always necessary to bring copies of your advance reading, so be sure to refer to the course information on the RBS website. Additionally, you may find it helpful to read previous course evaluations online for information about what to bring. In general, a light rain jacket (and/or umbrella) is useful.

Pharmacies & Medical Facilities

The nearest pharmacy is a CVS located at 433 L'Enfant Plaza Center, three blocks south of the Freer/Sackler Galleries; (202)554-5270.

The most convenient emergency room is at George Washington University Hospital at 900 23rd Street NW; emergency department phone (202)715-4911.
