

Rare Book School Selects Ten Junior Fellows in Critical Bibliography

Charlottesville, VA, 6 May 2021—Rare Book School (RBS) at the University of Virginia has selected ten Junior Fellows to join the Andrew W. Mellon Society of Fellows in Critical Bibliography (SoFCB). Fellows will participate in a two-year program that includes Rare Book School coursework, symposia, and other bibliographical activities.

Building on the success of the Andrew W. Mellon Fellowship of Scholars in Critical Bibliography, the SoFCB advances the study of texts, images, and artifacts as material objects through capacious, interdisciplinary scholarship. It enriches humanistic inquiry and education by identifying, mentoring, and training promising early-career scholars. Junior Fellows in good standing will advance to Senior status in the Society upon successful completion of the program.

The ten new Mellon Fellows were chosen by the SoFCB Selection Committee from a highly competitive field of 96 applicants. These promising scholars represent a broad spectrum of disciplinary interests, and their projects include work in African American literary history, LGBTQ comics, Indigenous literatures in North America, Islamic art, and the digital humanities. Four of the fellowship recipients hold tenure-track academic positions; one is a librarian and curator; three hold postdoctoral fellowships; and two are doctoral candidates.

“This year’s new Junior Fellows bring an exciting range of interests and experiences to Rare Book School—we look forward to being part of their intellectual journeys and including them in our own.
