Thank you for your interest in joining the Andrew W. Mellon Society of Fellows in Critical Bibliography (SoFCB) at Rare Book School (RBS). As you consider becoming part of this dynamic network of scholars dedicated to the study of material texts, you may be wondering—as some of us have over the years—whether your intellectual pursuits and life experiences will be embraced by institutions with a complicated history of racial and class differences. We are Junior and Senior Fellows from diverse racial, regional, and class backgrounds working and studying at museums and in public and private universities. We have been coming to Rare Book School since 2013, originally as part of the Andrew W.
