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RBS in Cambridge



CAMBRIDGE, MASSACHUSETTS is a city of some 100,000 persons, located just across the Charles River from Boston.

The city was founded in the 1630s by the original Massachusetts Bay Colony Puritans. It is home to various museums,

including the Peabody Museum of Archeology & Ethnology and the Harvard Semitic Museum, both located on the grounds of Harvard University. Across the river in Boston reside the Museum of Fine Arts, the Boston Public Library, and the North Bennet Street School for your book-loving pleasure.

Cambridge itself is also home to two of America's most prestigious universities: the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) and Harvard University; the latter of which is generously hosting the following RBS course: "The History of Books and Printing in Korea" (H-160) will be taught by Beth McKillop and Mikyung Kang. McKillop is a senior research fellow at the Victoria & Albert Museum, and visiting lecturer and London University's School of Orientalism and African Studies. Kang is Librarian for the Korean Collection at the Harvard-Yenching Library at Harvard University.

The RBS Week

Before You Arrive

Reading Lists

All RBS courses have advance reading lists or assignments that RBS instructors expect their students to complete before they arrive. These are outlined at www.rarebookschool.org/reading.

Students should come to class prepared. Those who have trouble locating required readings might try obtaining them through interlibrary loan (ILL), from used or antiquarian booksellers through the Antiquarian Booksellers Association of America (ABAA), or online via sites such as www.bookfinder.com or www.vialibri.net.

Arrival & Departure Logistics

When thinking about your transportation arrangements, please remember that staying over Friday night after the last day of class can be an excellent idea, if you can swing it. Early evening ground and air travel is seldom much fun anywhere, but it can be especially difficult in a major metropolitan area. Arriving a day early may also be a good idea, as it can provide an opportunity to settle in, overcome jet lag, &c. RBS first-timers are often surprised by the intensity of the experience, so be sure to get some sleep before classes start!

It is advisable for students to carry a personal photo ID at all times.

Transportation

Taking the Train

If your place of embarkation is on the Northeast corridor it may be more convenient and affordable to use Amtrak (www.amtrak.com; 1-800-872-7245) as your means of travel.

The most convenient Amtrak station to Harvard is Boston South Station (2 Summer Street, Boston). It is accessible via the Northeast Regional and is only a short trip on the Red Line of the T to the Harvard campus in Cambridge.

Driving to Cambridge

If driving to Cambridge is more convenient for you, Boston is easily accessible via three major highways. Travelling North–South, possibly the fastest route would follow I-95 and I-90 while East–West travel would mainly follow I-90.

Air Travel

The major airport servicing Cambridge is Boston Logan International (BOS; 800-235-6426). The Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority (MBTA) runs the Silver Line SL1 BRT to connect all Logan International terminals to downtown Boston. The Blue Line will also get you to the airport, although with the added leg of a free shuttle from the stop to the terminal buildings. If you prefer water travel, the MBTA also runs a water shuttle that travels from Logan to downtown Boston. There is a free shuttle to ferry you between the terminal buildings and the dock near Logan.

Advance Advices

What to Bring

At RBS, dress is business casual for all events. Summer in Cambridge can be warm, with average highs in the mid-80s, and average lows in the 60s. RBS advises bringing a sweater as well as a rain coat and umbrella. In general, wearing layers is also a good idea to accommodate various temperatures in and out of the classroom.

RBS participants are encouraged to come to class prepared, and are required to be on time. Bring a watch. If you wish to take notes, plan accordingly. Pencils, paper, and other supplies are available at nearby convenience stores. Before leaving home, check the course description website and the reading list for specific instructions on what to bring. (It is not, for instance, always necessary to bring copies of your advance reading.) Other inside tips on what to bring can be found in the previous year's course evaluations, also available on the course website.

Pharmacies & Medical Facilities

In the event an RBS student falls ill, the closest pharmacy to the university is Skenderian Apothecary (1613 Cambridge Street, Cambridge; 617-354-5600). There is also a CVS Pharmacy nearby (6 John F. Kennedy Street, Cambridge; 617-354-4420).

There are two emergency rooms almost equidistant to Harvard University: Mount Auburn Hospital Emergency (330 Mount Auburn Street, Cambridge; 617-492-3500) and CHA Cambridge Hospital (1493 Cambridge Street, Cambridge; 617-665-1000). As always, if you need immediate help, dial 911.
