RBS in Upperville

UPPERVILLE, VA is a small town, founded in the 1790s, with a pop-



ulation of around 1,000. It is located in close proximity to Washington D.C. and is home to a number of historic thoroughbred horse farms.

In addition to these attractions, Upperville is also home to the Oak

Spring Garden Foundation (OSGF). The foundation was established in 1993 by Rachel Lambert "Bunny" Mellon to preserve and share her gardens and significant library collection of materials related to botany, horticulture, landscape design, and natural history. The work of the Oak Spring Garden Foundation brings visiting scholars to the Oak Spring estate for scholarly and artistic research using Mrs. Mellon's collection and gardens.

This year, the Oak Spring Garden Foundation will host the Rare Book School course "Six Hundred Years of Botanical Illustration," taught by Peter Crane and Roger Gaskell. We're excited that you've decided to join us in Upperville this summer, and we want to do all we can to deliver an exceptional educational experience. The RBS Week

All RBS students are expected to be in attendance and on time for all regularly scheduled classes, labs, and field trips. This is to ensure the quality and community of RBS as a school, and we insist that participants attend all sessions of their courses, unless presented with the most extraordinary of circumstances. Before you arrive

Reading Lists

Most RBS courses have advance reading lists or assignments that RBS instructors expect their students to complete before they arrive. These are outlined at www.rarebookschool.org/reading.

Students should come to class prepared. Those who have trouble locating required readings might try obtaining them through interlibrary loan (ILL), from used or antiquarian booksellers through the Antiquarian Booksellers Association of America (ABAA), or online via sites such as www.bookfinder.com or www.vialibri.net.

Arrival & Departure Logistics

OSGF provides a free shuttle to Dulles International Airport that will leave from Arrival Door 6 on Monday, July 15 at 3:00 p.m. If you catch this shuttle, you will be shown to your accommodations upon arrival at around 4 p.m. On Friday, 19 July, the shuttle will depart at 2 p.m. from the Brood Mare Barn, arriving at Dulles around 3 p.m.

If you are driving, please plan to arrive at the Oak Spring Garden Foundation between 1 and 4 p.m. on Monday. If you are unable to arrive by 5 p.m. please email rbsprograms@virginia.edu. When you arrive at OSGF, you will need to check in with security at the entrance. They will provide directions for arriving at your check-in point. Parking is available on site for free and instructions regarding where to park will be provided upon arrival.

Participants must check out of Oak Spring on Friday afternoon by 2 p.m. at the conclusion of class.

Wifi and Phones

Wifi is available in the classroom space and in student rooms. Students attending class at Oak Spring will be given a "Welcome Binder" filled with internet instructions, maps, and other helpful information to ensure a pleasant stay. OSGF is in a rural location where the connection can be slightly slow, but it does work. Please be aware that cell phone reception can be spotty.

Problems

Please let us know if you encounter problems on any front. Accommodations

Accommodations for RBS students will be provided by the Oak Spring Garden Foundation. Given the remote, rural location of OSGF, all participants must stay in the accommodations on-site, and additional guests or visitors are not allowed. RBS staff will send an email with additional information, a registration form, and instructions for paying the housing and food fee of \$850.

Accessibility and Security

OSGF is located in the foothills of the Blue Ridge, and the terrain is hilly. Most facilities at Oak Spring are about .25 mi apart and connected by footpaths, so we recommend comfortable walking shoes. Please contact rbsprograms@virginia.edu before your arrival if you have any specific accessibility needs (medical, physical etc.) which require accommodation. There is 24-hour security on site.

The address for the Oak Spring Garden Foundation is 1776 Loughborough Ln, Upperville, VA 20184. There is no public transportation to or from this location, and taxis or ride services should be scheduled in advance.

Air Travel

The closet airport is Dulles International Airport (IAD), located 30 miles from Oak Spring Garden Foundation (https://www.flydulles.com). We *strongly* recommend that you plan your trip to arrive at Dulles as OSGF will provide a shuttle to the Oak Spring Garden Foundation from that location (see the Shuttle section). Alternative options include Ronald Reagan Washington National Airport (https://www.flyreagan.com/) located approximately just over an hour from Oak Spring and Baltimore/Washington International Thurgood Marshall Airport (https://www.bwiairport.com), approximately 1 hours and 45 minutes from Oak Spring.

Driving to Upperville

The main highway into Upperville is US Route 50 / John S Mosby Hwy. Another option would be to take US Route 17 / Winchester Rd. For participants who are not regionally located, and who may not have access to a car, we suggest taking the OSGF shuttle from Dulles, hiring a taxi or car, or taking a Lyft or Uber out to OSGF.

Shuttle

OSGF has provided a free shuttle that will leave from Arrival Door 6 at Dulles International Airport on Monday, July 15 at 3:00 p.m. sharp. Please contact Danielle Eady (programs@osgf.org) by Monday, July 8 to reserve a seat. The shuttle will also be available to drop students off at Dulles on Friday, 19 July and will depart no later than 1:30 p.m. Please contact Danielle Eady (programs@osgf.org) by Wednesday, July 17 to reserve a seat.

Taking the Train

The two closest Amtrak stations include Manassas station (9431 West Street, Manassas) and Washington Union Station (50 Massachusetts Ave NE, Washington DC). Manassas Station is approximately 33 miles from Oak Spring. Washington Union Station is located 70 miles from Oak Spring, when avoiding toll roads. From these stations, one can either rent a car, order an Uber/Lyft, or find another means to travel the remaining distance to your accommodations in Upperville.

Advance Advices

What to Bring

For RBS events, the casual end of business casual dress is recommended (i.e. jeans are fine, ties are not expected). Summer in Upperville can range from mild to warm, with average temperatures ranging from 85 degrees Fahrenheit in the daytime to 69 degrees at night. With these temperatures and classroom comfort in mind, please pack appropriately. In general, bringing comfortable shoes and an umbrella is also a good idea.

RBS participants are expected to come to class prepared, and are required to be on time. Bring a watch. If you wish to take notes, plan accordingly by bringing pencils, paper, and other supplies. Before leaving home, check the course description and the reading list on the RBS website for specific instructions on what to bring. (It is not, for instance, always necessary to bring copies of your advance reading.)

Pharmacies & Medical Facilities

The nearest pharmacy is a Safeway located at 12 W Washington St (540-687-6438), approximately 8 miles from Oak Spring. The next closet pharmacy is Walgreens at 761 E Main St, Purcellville (540-751-0962), located approximately 19 miles from Oak Spring. The nearest hospital emergency room is located at Warren Memorial Hospital at 351 Valley Health Way, Front Royal (540-636-0314). This hospital is approximately 30 minutes from Oak Spring. As always, if you need immediate help, dial 911.
