economic powerhouse in the heart of the Midwest. Renowned for its iconic skyline punctuated by architectural marvels such as the Willis Tower and the John Hancock Center, Chicago boasts a rich history steeped in innovation, commerce, and diversity. Notably, Chicago is home to the esteemed Newberry Library, founded in 1887. The library was designed to complement the Chicago Public Library, which had been established in 1872. The Newberry's first librarians grew the

library's collection from the ground up, and today the Newberry collection extends across 27.5 miles of shelving in the library stacks.

This year, Chicago will host the Rare Book School courses: "A History of the Indigenous Book in the Americas" taught by Will Hansen, Julie Baskes Vice President for Collections and Library Services, and Curator of Americana at the Newberry Library, and Robert Warrior, Hall Distinguished Professor of American Literature and Culture at the University of Kansas, and "The History of Typography" taught by Jill Gage, Custodian of the John M. Wing Foundation on the History of Printing at the Newberry Library.

The RBS Week

All RBS students are expected to be in attendance and on time for all regularly scheduled classes, labs, and field trips. This is to ensure the quality and community of RBS as a School, and we insist that participants attend all sessions of their courses, unless presented with the most extraordinary of circumstances. Practically speaking, this involves a full-time commitment of one-and-a-half hours on Sunday evening, 8:30 a.m.–5 p.m. Monday through Thursday, and 8:30 a.m.–4 p.m. Friday. Before you arrive

Reading Lists

Most RBS courses have advance reading lists or assignments that RBS instructors expect their students to complete before they arrive. These are outlined at <u>www.rarebookschool.org/reading</u>.

Students should come to class prepared. Those who have trouble locating required readings might try obtaining them through interlibrary loan (ILL), from used or antiquarian booksellers through the Antiquarian Booksellers Association of America (ABAA), or online via sites such as www.bookfinder.com or www.vialibri.net.

Arrival & Departure Logistics

When thinking about your transportation arrangements, please remember that staying over Friday night after the last day of class can be an excellent idea, if you can swing it. Arriving a day early may also be a good idea, as it can provide an opportunity to settle in, overcome jet lag, &c. RBS first-timers are often surprised by the intensity of the experience, so be sure to get some sleep before class starts!

Problems

Accommodations

Perhaps the most inexpensive and convenient lodgings are available through DePaul University Conference & Event Services, which offers short-term summer housing in the DePaul University dormitories. Students who opt to stay at the dorms will be provided with a single occupancy room for \$145 per night, which will include a linen pack that contains the following items: sheets, a blanket, towels, and a washcloth (pillows are provided with the room). The Newberry website also provides a list of hotel suggestions on their FAQ page, linked here. Please note that this list of accommodations is a resource for visitors; it does not constitute an endorsement by the Newberry Library or Rare Book School.

It would be wise to look into these options earlier, rather than later, as the course week coincides with the end of Lollapalooza. As the festival dates approach, hotel and airfare prices will increase, and availability will decrease.

Transportation

Air Travel

The closet airport to the Newberry is Chicago Midway International Airport, located 13 miles away (https:// www.flychicago.com/midway). Another solid option is Chicago O'Hare International Airport (https://www. flychicago.com/ohare) located approximately half an hour from the Newberry.

Driving to the Newberry Library

From the Kennedy Expressway (I-90)

Exit Ohio Street east, and follow Ohio about one mile to Dearborn Street. Turn left on Dearborn and go a half-mile north to Walton Street. The Newberry will be on your left, at the corner of Dearborn and Walton

From Lake Shore Drive (US Highway 41)

Exit Lake Shore Drive onto LaSalle Drive. After a quarter-mile, turn left on Clark Street. Take Clark for about one mile. The Newberry will be on your left,

between Oak and Walton streets. Please note: Walton is one-way westbound, so you cannot take a left onto Walton from Clark.

Taking the Train

- Amtrak: Trains arrive at Union Station.
- Metra: The Chicago area's commuter rail system operates at four major stations: Ogilvie Transportation Center, Millennium Station, LaSalle Street Station, and Union Station.
- South Shore Line: Trains run between South Bend, Indiana, and Chicago (Millennium Station).

From these stations, one can either use public transportation, order an Uber/Lyft, or find another means to travel the remaining distance to your accommodations.

Advance Advices

What to Bring

At RBS, dress is business casual for all events. Summer in Chicago can range from warm to blistering hot, with average temperatures ranging from 70 degrees to 81 degrees Fahrenheit. *With these temperatures and classroom comfort in mind, please pack appropriately.* In general, bringing comfortable shoes and an umbrella is also a good idea.

RBS participants are expected to come to class prepared, and are required to be on time. Bring a watch. If you wish to take notes, plan accordingly. Pencils, paper, and other supplies are available at nearby convenience stores. Before leaving home, check the course description and the reading list on the RBS website for specific instructions on what to bring. (It is not, for instance, always necessary to bring copies of your advance reading.)

Pharmacies & Medical Facilities

The nearest pharmacy is a CVS located at 1201 N State St (312-640-2842). For 24-hour service, visit the Walgreens located at 757 N Michigan Ave (312-664-8686). This location is approximately a 12-minute walk from the Newberry Library. The nearest hospital emergency room is the Northwestern Memorial Hospital Emergency Department located at 251 E Huron St (312-926-2000). As always, if you need immediate assistance, dial 911.
