versity of Michigan boasts one of the largest research libraries in the United States. The University of Michigan Library has physical locations throughout the campus and offers a wealth of resources in traditional as well as digital formats, encompassing more than 14 million print volumes and one of the finest digital collections in the world. This year, Ann Arbor will host the Rare Book School course: "Paper as Bibliographical Evidance" taught by Cathleen A. Baker.

The RBS Week

All RBS students are expected to be in attendance and on time for all regularly scheduled classes, labs, and field trips. This is to ensure the quality and community of RBS as a School, and we insist that participants attend all sessions of their courses, unless presented with the most extraordinary of circumstances. Practically speaking, this involves a full-time commitment of one-and-a-half hours on Sunday evening, 8:30 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday through Thursday, and 8:30 a.m.-4 p.m. Friday. Reading Lists

Most RBS courses have advance reading lists or assignments that RBS instructors expect their students to complete before they arrive. These are outlined at www.rarebookschool.org/reading.

Students should come to class prepared. Those who have trouble locating required readings might try obtaining them through interlibrary loan (ILL), from used or antiquarian booksellers through the Antiquarian Booksellers Association of America (ABAA), or online via sites such as www.vialibri.net.

Arrival & Departure Logistics

When thinking about your transportation arrangements, please remember that staying over Friday night after the last day of class can be an excellent idea, if you can swing it. Arriving a day early may also be a good idea, as it can provide an opportunity to settle in, overcome jet lag, &c. RBS first-timers are often surprised by the intensity of the experience, so be sure to get some sleep before class starts!

Accommodations

Perhaps the most inexpensive and convenient lodgings are available through the University of Michigan Conference & Event Services, which offers short-term summer housing in the University of Michigan dormitories. Students who opt to stay at the dorms will be provided with a single occupancy room for \$76 per night, which will include a linen pack that contains the following items: sheets, a blanket, towels, and a washcloth (pillows are provided with the room). Hotels

Students taking a course at the University of Michigan aslo have the option of staying in a nearby hotel. Some recommendations include The Graduate, The Residence Inn by Marriott, and The Bell Tower Hotel. The Graduate is located at 615 E Huron St (855-696-6258); the Residence Inn by Marriott is located at 120 West Huron Street (844-631-0595); and The Bell Tower Hotel is located at 300 S Thayer St (800-562-3559). Please be advised that there may be other events happening the same week, so hotels may fill rather quickly.

Air Travel

The closest airport to the University of Michigan is Detroit Metropolitan International Airport (DTW), situated 25 miles away. For students seeking shuttle services, two good options are the Michigan Flyer and the AirBus.

Michigan Flyer

The Michigan Flyer offers convenient service to and from DTW. The prepaid fare is \$15 one-way or \$25 round-trip. Tickets purchased on the bus are priced at \$18. For more information, you can contact them at 517-333-0400.

AirBus

For the most affordable airport transportation, the Central Student Government (CSG) AirBus is a great option. It provides service with pick-up at three designated campus locations. For more inforation, please visit the website.

Taking the Train

The closest Amtrak station is located in Ann Arbor at 325 Depot Street, (800-231-2222). From here, you can find a bus route, order an Uber/Lyft, or find another means to travel the remaining distance to your accommodations.

Driving to the University of Michigan

Interstate 94 (I-94) is the main highway that connects to the University of Michigan from Detroit, Chicago, and other areas.

If you are coming from Detroit or Chicago, take I-94 West to Exit 177. From Lansing: take I-96 East to US-23 South, then M-14 West. From Ohio: take US-23 North to the Washtenaw-Ann Arbor exit (Exit 37B). From Northern MI: Take I-75 South to US-23 South, then M-14 West.

Advance Advices

What to Bring

At RBS, dress is business casual for all events. Summer in Ann Arbor can range from mild to warm, with average temperatures ranging from 79 degrees Fahrenheit in the daytime to 59 degrees at night. With these temperatures and classroom comfort in mind, please pack appropriately. In general, bringing comfortable shoes and an umbrella is also a good idea.

RBS participants are expected to come to class prepared, and are required to be on time. Bring a watch. If you wish to take notes, plan accordingly. Pencils, paper, and other supplies are available at nearby convenience stores. Before leaving home, check the course description and the reading list on the RBS website for specific instructions on what to bring. (It is not, for instance, always necessary to bring copies of your advance reading.)

Pharmacies & Medical Facilities

The nearest pharmacy is a Walgreens located at 317 S State St (734-352-3623). The nearest health care center is the A. Alfred Taubman Health Care Center located at 1500 E. Medical Center Drive (734-936-4000). The nearest emergency room is the University of Michigan Hopsital Emergency Room located at 1500 E Medical Center Dr (734-936-6666).
