LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

"I WILL BEAR WITNESS," says the speaking book in William Langland's sprawling poem *Piers Plowman* (c.1380). Through its educational program of hands-on classes, Rare Book School compellingly demonstrates how books, manuscripts, maps, and photographs testify to the history of their production, distribution, and reception.

Reading the record of human history with new proficiency, RBS students experience the pastness of the past in unprecedented ways. "The aim of bibliography," Donald McKenzie reminds us, "is to reveal the human presences in every recorded text."

Learning to read the whole book—to investigate and interpret paper, type, bindings, mise-enpage, illustrations, and more—is the gratifying work of bibliographical literacy. Coming to understand the meaning and significance of advertisements, prices, imprints or colophons, congers, provenance, and the like enables one to know the pleasures of book-historical fluency. All these forms of expertise are best acquired in community, not least because the demands of historical knowledge across times and cultures can never be fully met by any one individual.

Fittingly, the community of Rare Book School at the University of Virginia spans the globe: some 565 students from a dozen countries studied with us this past fiscal year. Selected from more than 1,000 applicants, they took classes at ten different partner institutions as well as online. Our students came from Belgium, Brazil, Canada, China, Denmark, France, Ireland, Mexico, the Netherlands, Pakistan, the United Kingdom, and 40 states in the U.S.A. For the first time, RBS offered classes at the Newberry Library and at the University of Chicago. This coming summer we will debut at the University of Michigan and premiere our first international courses at Oxford University's Bodleian Library.

The colorful pages of this annual report bear eloquent witness to the vibrancy of our RBS community—the avidity of our students, the dedication and intellectual energies of our world-class faculty, the generous professionalism of our staff, and the goodness and constancy of our donors. Guided and governed by a clear-sighted and wise Board of Directors, Rare Book School at the University of Virginia continues to go from strength to strength.

Thank you for being part of our School, and for supporting our unremitting commitment to educational excellence. Our work together testifies to the central importance of the record of human aspiration and achievement. Our community is a living witness to the value of the humanities and the essential nature of the library and archive.

IMPACT STORY: ELIZAVETA STRAKHOV

Elizaveta Strakhov, Immediate Past President of the Andrew W. Mellon Society of Fellows in Critical Bibliography (SoFCB), joined the SoFCB (in its earlier iteration as the RBS Mellon Fellowship in Critical Bibliography) in 2015. "I feel no hesitation," she comments, "in saying that joining the SoFCB fully transformed my academic life and research."

Drawing on her RBS courses, Strakhov redesigned the syllabi for the book history classes she teaches at Marquette University to better incorporate elements of critical bibliography and make use of Marquette's

special collections. She also has applied the knowledge and connections she gained at RBS to co-organizing symposia, workshops, and other scholarly events.

Through the SoFCB, Strakhov has forged lasting friendships and built invaluable networks of, as she puts it, "like-minded colleagues, collaborators, and co-detectives in bibliographical whodunits." With some of her SoFCB peers, Strakhov also formed a working group that has been meeting for nearly three years, leading to new publications and fostering a flow of ideas and mutual support.

A Collection Dedicated to Teaching Books as **Physical Objects**

VISUALIZE A SHELF OF BOOKS whose spines do not feature Library of Congress classification numbers, but instead bibliographical terms: chapbook, clasps, colophon, copyright edition, *corner-pieces*—or *leaf book*, *leaflet*, *leatherette*, *levant*. This collection, known at Rare Book School as "3-D Carter," is now shelved within a magnificent glass-fronted nineteenth-century hardwood bookcase dubbed "Leviathan" owing to its tremendous size.

Initially created by RBS Founding Director Terry Belanger decades ago at Columbia University, this RBS study collection constitutes a tactile glossary of physical specimens, shelved alphabetically by term, that go hand-in-hand with entries from John Carter's classic reference work, ABC for Book Collectors. First printed in 1952 and for many years unillustrated, Carter's ABC is still considered an essential resource in the fields of librarianship and bibliography-and now, fittingly (if not somewhat circuitously), color images of items from RBS's collection illustrate the pages of the ninth edition, edited by Nicolas Barker and Simran Thadani.

The "3-D Carter" collection is just one among scores of specialized units that constitute Rare Book School's holdings geared toward hands-on book-historical education. As Belanger was once fond of reminding visitors, "Rare Book School's collection is a laboratory, not a library." His maxim succinctly conveys one of the core principles underlying the School's celebrated teaching collections: RBS's collections are meant to be handled and inspected as physical objects-

specimens that convey the history of the book, broadly conceived, and it many technologies. The School's collections-which include not only printed artifacts, but also equipment such as wood-carved blocks, intaglio plates, type molds and matrices, and printing presses—are organized to demonstrate how books and related textual artifacts have been created, marketed, circulated, adapted, and read over time, from the distant past to the present day. The collection's aim is to support hands-on courses that teach students skills-based methods for detecting the physical traces left by these activities, as well as the broader social histories of the many communities who have made their mark on the book-as-object.


From its inception at Columbia University under Belanger, the collection featured not only textual artifacts, but also a variety of bookmaking and printing equipment to facilitate hands-on lab-based exercises, such as printing and bookbinding demonstrations. Indeed, the first major gift to what would become the Rare Book School teaching collection arrived in 1974, when a Baltimore printer, Maurice Annenberg, donated 48 drawers of wood type to Belanger's program (then known as the Book Arts Press). Then came an 1885 Washingtonstyle Wessel flatbed press, acquired through the generosity of the Langguth Foundation.

Over time, Belanger assiduously assembled bespoke teaching kits that formed the basis of the collection: leather and cloth bindings arranged in chronological order to call attention to changes in bookbinding styles; illustration "packets" containing nine or more examples from the same printed source and created to teach the hallmarks of specific processes, such as stipple or aquatint; and typography packets designed to instruct students how to identify and differentiate historical typefaces.

As the collection grew, so did the program. In 1983, Rare Book School was born, allowing students outside of Columbia University to attend week-long courses, further widening the bibliographical skirts of light. By the time RBS moved to the University of Virginia in 1992, the Mayflower moving truck bill of lading showed that its teaching collections weighed 20 tons. We estimate that the collection contains some 100,000 items.

While humble in their origins, the School's teaching collections now include rare materials that represent a much broader and older history of the book. Some decades ago, Kenneth W. Rendell donated a large number of manuscripts and fragments to RBS that included a remarkable cartonnage papyrus fragment written in Demotic. We recently learned that the fragment, dating from 300 BCE, features a portion of an ancient Egyptian literary narrative—a scarce and early example of its kind.

In 1999, RBS was given many pieces of manuscript waste donated from the collection of Robert O. Dougan, among them a fragment of the 1459 Mainz psalter—an item that the School still uses to teach the difference between manuscript and print (particularly given our scarce resources in this period). In 2005, the Anthon family donated a Nuremberg Chronicle. In 2013, Hans and Eva-Maria Tausig gave RBS their Flemish Book of Hours (*c*.1470), a stunning illuminated manuscript on parchment

containing six full-page miniatures painted by Willem Vrelant or a follower in his circle. The next year, the Tausigs made another key gift: a 1510 Book of Hours printed on parchment by Gilles Hardouyn and featuring 47 printed metal cuts illuminated in gold and colors by a contemporary hand.

In 2022, RBS received a landmark gift when Xia Wei and Soren Edgren donated more than two hundred rare books, manuscripts, artifacts, and related objects from their Guanhailou Collection, formed to teach the history and technology of the book in East Asia, primarily China. In 2024, Rebecca Boyd donated a leaf from the Gutenberg Bible to RBS ("A Noble Fragment") on behalf of the family of Harry Burgess Hillman. And at the end of 2024, Jon A. Lindseth, a longtime supporter of RBS's collections, gifted the School a significant collection of Hogarth Press materials, along with other works by Virginia Woolf, including a first edition of Orlando, typeset by Frederick Warde and printed by the house of William Edwin, and Street Haunting, printed by the Grabhorn Press—both signed by Woolf in her iconic purple pen. These additions are not only

inspiring monuments; when placed within the larger context of the School's collection, they allow us to communicate the long history of the global book across a variety of cultures, formats, and time periods.

Having moved into our newly built quarters within UVA's Edgar Shannon Library, RBS now has a vast public-facing, high-traffic exhibition space that provides a window into the School and its varied activities. Although bibliography is often seen as a niche or specialized method of study, our 24-case gallery provides a complementary canvas for engaging the public. Our bibliographical collections offer a fascinating array of objects-from sumptuous rolls of mulberry bark papers and bookbinding leathers to reed pens and guills used by scribes to hand-carved blocks from both the East and the West. It is our hope that, in the coming years, the engaging variety of physical formats among our holdings will attract and educate passersby-ideally serving as gateways for those who may become interested in the finer points of hands-on book history and bibliographical study.

RBS Receives Largest Donation in School's History

\$3.1 Million Gift Endows Permanent Curator Position

GLEN AND CATHY MIRANKER have been supporters of Rare Book School initiatives for years. So, what inspired them to make a \$3.1 million donation—the largest single gift in the School's 42-year history—to RBS?


"There's no place that better fulfills our yen for the up-close-and-personal exploration of books," Cathy and Glen wrote. "The School's unique, hands-on approach to instruction brings unparalleled insights into the life and times of books."

From their homes in San Francisco and New York City, the Mirankers have sought unusual forms of contact with book history. "Years ago, in Siena (Italy), we talked our way into the city archives and spent the day sketching the sewing structures of thirteenth- and fourteenthcentury ledgers," Cathy recalled. More recently, the couple had a breathtaking moment at the Oxford University Press Archives when they held and read some of the nineteenth-century handwritten definition slips for the Oxford English Dictionary.

The couple enjoys aiding and abetting each other's bookish interests. In off hours, while working as Apple's Chief Technology Officer, Glen crafted wooden boards that Cathy used to create a replica Roman wax tablet book. As an amateur bookbinder, Cathy has made slipcases, chemises, and clamshell boxes for pamphlets, magazines, and books in Glen's collection. She even started Glen on his Sherlock Holmes collection in 1976, finding an American first edition of *The Case-Book of Sherlock Holmes* at a Harvard Yard book fair.

In their most gratifying collaboration, the couple curated items from their collection for an exhibition called "Sherlock Holmes in 221 Objects," (named for the fictional detective's address, 221B Baker Street), which debuted at the Grolier Club in 2022, as well as co-writing, designing, and publishing a catalog.

For Glen, Rare Book School plays a vital role in his growth as a collector.

"I'm interested in the stories my books have to tell beyond the text on the page and about the community–authors, illustrators, designers, papermakers, bookbinders, printers, publishers, booksellers, collectors–that had a hand in their production," he said. "RBS is teaching me how to read the whole book."

Glen first met the School's Executive Director, Michael F. Suarez, S.J., over coffee in San Francisco. "I invited Michael over for coffee, and we went into my library," Glen said. "Next thing we knew, it was lunchtime, then suppertime, and we had spent this wonderful day exploring books."

Suarez invited Glen to give a talk before a Rare Book School session, and afterward, Glen took his first class about nineteenth-century massmarket publications. He was hooked.

"It was absolutely magic," Glen said. "It opened my eyes to how much there was to learn and how much better a collector taking more classes would make me." He has since become a frequent student and is a member of Rare Book School's Board.

The Mirankers' transformational gift is the first of its kind and endows a full-time curatorial position for the School's exhibitions program and teaching collection of more than 100,000 items. Now called the Miranker Family Director of Collections, Exhibitions & Scholarly Initiatives, the position is held by Barbara Heritage, who has worked at RBS since 2002.

"Endowing this key position gives Rare Book School greater financial sustainability over the long term, and so may be understood as a perpetual gift to our current and future students," explained Suarez. "My hope is that others will be inspired by Cathy's and Glen's leadership to further safeguard the future of RBS and its mission into the twenty-first century."

Priti Joshi

Priti Joshi describes her Rare Book School experience as "transformative."

Joshi, a 2023–24 RBS Lang Fellow who teaches at the University of Puget Sound, used the Lang Fellowship, which supports faculty from small U.S. institutions of higher education, to identify materials for use in a lower-division undergraduate class designed for students from different majors and interests. "As somebody who was never trained as a book historian or bibliographer but who fell into the field, I lacked the confidence to teach a class of this nature," says Joshi. However, in the summer of 2023, she took H-165: Book History, Bibliography, and Humanities Teaching, a course geared toward Lang Fellows and taught by RBS Executive

Director Michael F. Suarez, S.J. The experience provided Joshi with the bibliographical expertise she needed to develop and teach her class, The Book as Human Artifact.

"Prior to taking RBS classes, I would never have had the courage to ask antiquarian booksellers questions about purchases," says Joshi. "The confidence I've gained has opened so many doors and made me real friends in that world."



The wrapper of Part 44 features an advertisement for "Handsome Cloth Cases for Binding this Work . . . supplied at 2s. 6d. each"), as well as a "family register" at its end for recording births, marriages, and deaths.

FINANCIAL ASSETS & ACTIVITIES

OCTOBER 2023 - SEPTEMBER 2024

RARE BOOK SCHOOL concluded its 2024 fiscal year in good financial health and well-positioned to carry out its educational mission. An examination of its 2023–24 financial records reveals a vibrant and growing organization with a strong and stable fiscal infrastructure.

Gross tuition revenue from the 565 students attending courses in FY24 made up the largest percentage of the School's operating income. Course offerings included 43 week-long classes running in Charlottesville as well as at our partner institutions, including the Grolier Club, Harvard University, the New York Public Library, the University of Pennsylvania, and Yale University. We are particularly proud to report that 159 students, or 28% of those attending, received a full scholarship or fellowship supporting their attendance at RBS.

Tuition revenue alone does not cover the costs of attending RBS. For each student paying regular tuition, Rare Book School must raise an additional *c*.\$2,500 to cover the costs of running the School's programs. Generous contributions from individual donors help to sustain our School's daily operations; over the past ten years, annual giving has increased by more than 90%.

In addition to benefitting from healthy tuition revenues, generous contributions from individuals and foundations, and scholarship funds released from restrictions, we also strengthened our financial position via returns on our donor-designated endowments. This income from our endowment account (in the form of a smoothed 4% drawdown, based on the average of 12 trailing quarters) helps us to manage our operating expenses and meet programmatic needs for the School, currently covering approximately 11% of our annual costs.

Thanks to the generosity of donors contributing to the endowment during our recent campaign, endowment income will cover an even larger percentage of costs in the next year. Wouldn't it be great if over time we could grow our endowment so that our annual 4% drawdown, instead of covering 11% of annual costs, accounted for 30% of annual costs? Building on the momentum of our campaign and continuing to grow our endowment over the next several years, we hope to buttress a healthy and robust financial infrastructure, maintain and enhance our course offerings, and guarantee access to Rare Book School programs through scholarship and fellowship opportunities.

We have posted on our website the School's 990 Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax form as well as our audited financial statements. With the help of our generous donors and dedicated students, the finances of our School are in excellent shape.

On behalf of the School and its Board of Directors, thank you for your ongoing support of our programs.





As a 2022–24 Andrew W. Mellon Fellow for Diversity, Inclusion & Cultural Heritage (CHF), Talea Anderson wanted to raise awareness about disability history and to make museum experiences more accessible for blind and low-vision audiences. Using Rare Book School funding, Anderson collaborated on a pop-up exhibition, "War of the Dots: A Short History of Tactile Print," at Washington State School of the Blind in summer 2024.

"I've been really inspired by the ideas, passions, and interests of others who took part in [the CHF program]," Anderson said in a news story by her home institution, Washington State University. "I've also appreciated having the space and time to cultivate a

relationship with Washington State School of the Blind. I'm grateful that the fellowship helped make that possible."
